In John C. Olin's introduction to the biography of St. Ignatius, he speaks of Ignatius's story as an interior history, one of inward transformation and spiritual growth. In the meantime, we continue to foster meaningful relationships with our CJ Sisters and harness the goodwill which is so evident on both sides.
